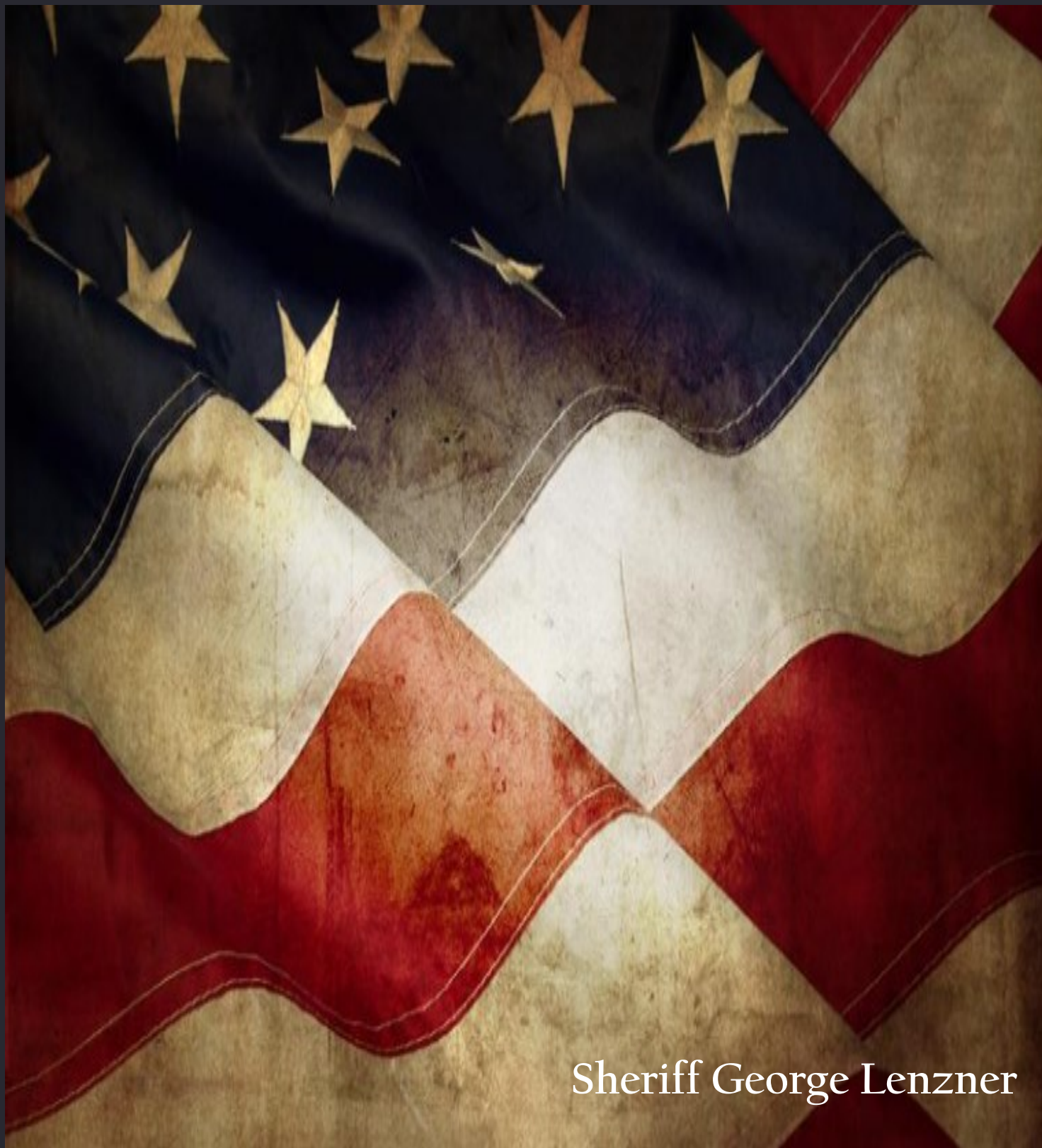

Welcome to the 2024 Shawano County Sheriff's Office Annual Report. It is my privilege to provide you with a high-level overview of the dedicated work of our team at the Shawano County Sheriff's Office. The department is comprised of many hard working members from administration, clerical, communications, traffic, investigations, corrections, courthouse security, school resources, and emergency management. I am proud of the dedication all divisions continue to display, as we work together to keep our community safe.



In 2024, the County funded an additional Courthouse Security Deputy position. The two full-time Courthouse Security Deputies have been working diligently this past year to implement improvements and safeguards for all court operations. The Sheriff's Office will continue every effort to mitigate issues until a new court facility is designed with enhanced safety measures.

Our K9 Arres retired in 2024. He served the Shawano County Sheriff's Office well throughout his career and we wish him all the best in his K9 retirement. In his place is K9 Ruckus with a new handler, Deputy Jacob Ostrowski. This new team trains and works together very well. We look forward to reporting on their efforts in serving our citizens.

The Sheriff's Office continues to prioritize the mental health and peer support for the members of our office. An employee wellness program was implemented in 2024 for all emergency staff. Additionally, the inmate health care plan has provided mental health services for inmates as well. Efforts have taken place to reduce stress on our emergency personnel and retain the hardworking members of our team.

In 2025, the Sheriff's Office will be referring two major cold cases to the District Attorney's Office for criminal charges. Numerous investigative efforts and hours contributed to this conclusion. We are thankful for the dedication of those who assisted in this pursuit of justice.



We continue to stress the importance of safety on our roadways to include all vehicles lawfully following traffic safety laws. I will be working with county officials on necessary amendments to the ATV/UTV ordinance in 2025.

The Sheriff's Office remains committed to providing professional and effective law enforcement services. We value teamwork and maintaining strong partnerships. I want to thank you for your support and for the opportunity to serve Shawano County.

SCHOOL RESOURCES AND COURT SECURITY DIVISIONS

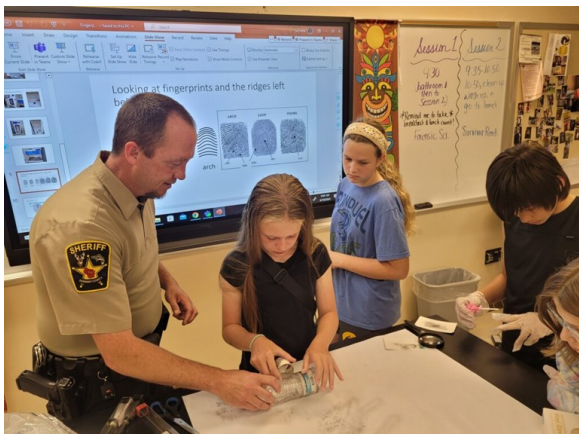


Court Security Officer

The Shawano County Sheriff's Office Court Security Division oversees all security operations within the Shawano County Courthouse. This includes transporting inmates from the jail to their court appearances, maintaining a presence during all restraining order and injunction proceedings, and ensuring the overall safety of the courthouse and its staff. In addition, the division coordinates inmate transports for medical appointments, facilitates transfers between facilities, and manages the movement of inmates from other correctional institutions for court appearances. In response to the growing demand for enhanced courthouse security, the Sheriff's Office collaborated with county officials to secure funding for a second full-time court security officer, a position that officially began in January 2024. This additional role significantly strengthened our presence within the courthouse, providing greater support not just in courtrooms, but throughout the entire facility in 2024.

School Resource Officer

The Shawano County Sheriff's Office currently has one full-time School Resource Officer (SRO), Deputy Nate Thornborrow. Deputy Thornborrow serves multiple districts, including the Bonduel School District, Wolf River Lutheran High School, Tigerton School District, and the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District. His role includes assisting school administration with disciplinary matters as needed, while also building positive relationships with students and staff. Over the past year, Deputy Thornborrow has continued to make a meaningful impact both in our schools and throughout the community. He remains committed to being proactive and involved, frequently participating in school events and activities to serve as a positive role model for students. Additionally, he has been instrumental in supporting community initiatives such as Shop with a Cop and Toys for Tots, both of which directly benefit local children. In 2024, Deputy Thornborrow was also a crucial piece in a county-wide effort implementing the Standard Response Protocol to each school district to enhance our overall school safety efforts.



RECREATIONAL PATROL GRANTS

ATV PATROL

Received \$5,199 of enforcement reimbursement from the DNR at 86.54% reimbursement for expenses.

Enforcement includes 44 patrol hours, resulting in 12 citations and 10 warnings issued.



SNOW PATROL

Received \$3,566 of enforcement reimbursement from the DNR at 100% reimbursement for expenses.

Enforcement includes 42.5 patrol hours, resulting in 3 citations and 12 warnings issued.



WATER PATROL

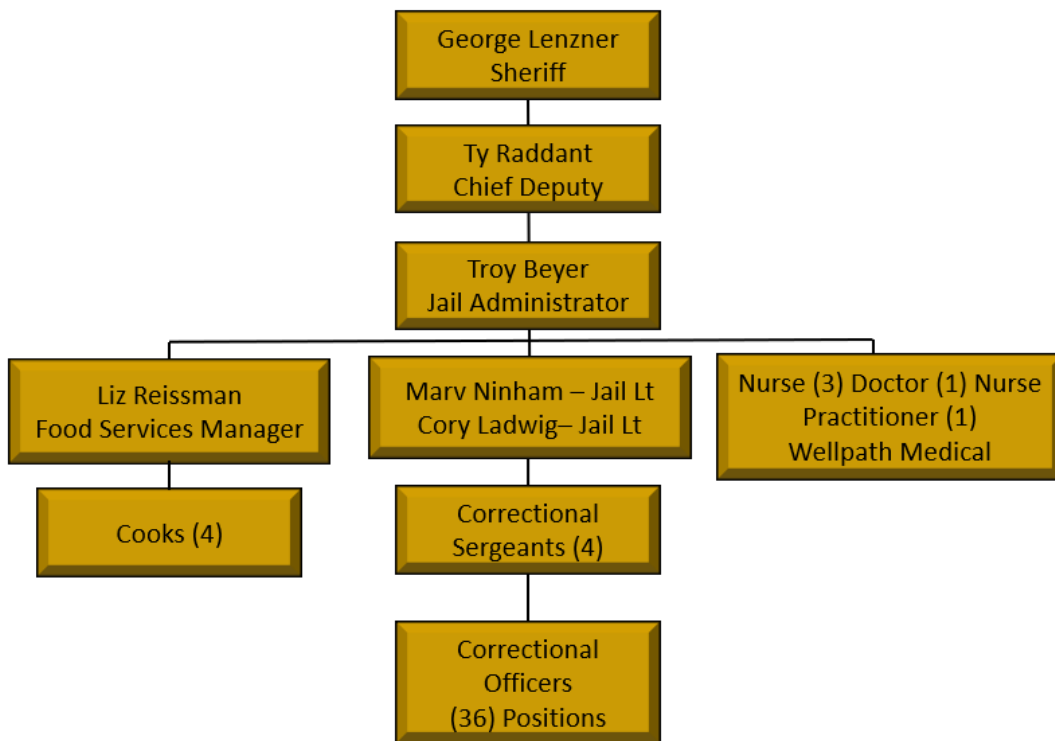
Received \$5,163 of enforcement reimbursement from the DNR at 56.97% reimbursement for expenses.

Enforcement includes 85 patrol hours, resulting in 12 citations and 51 warnings issued.

JAIL DIVISION

Further, the Jail Division is committed to the ultimate release of persons confined, to the community, with a better physical and psychological perspective.

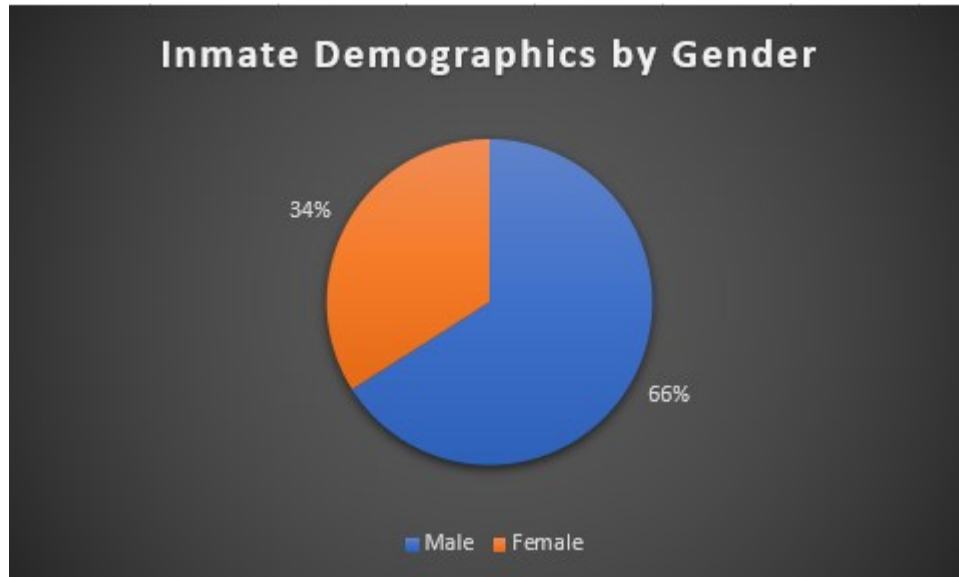

INMATE 2024 STATISTICS

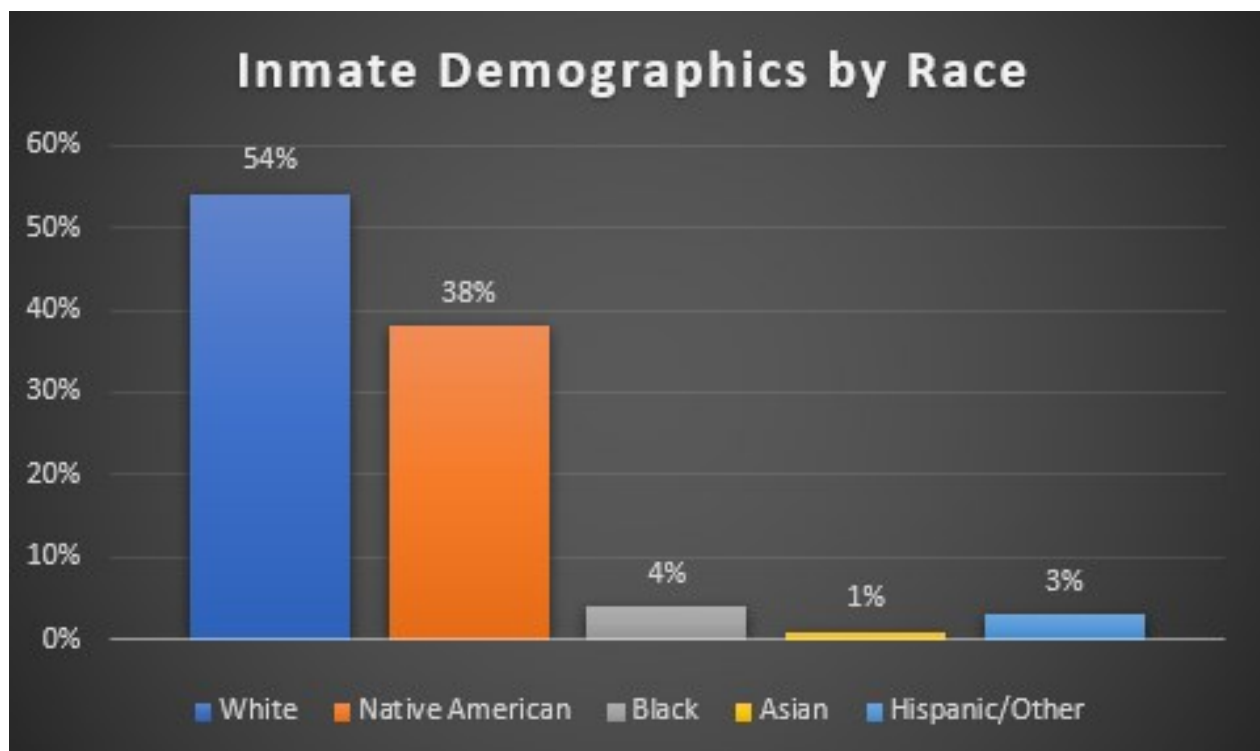


2024 Jail Bookings/New Admissions

INMATE MEDICAL

Since late 2003, the Shawano County Jail has contracted inmate healthcare to a correctional healthcare provider. Wellpath is contracted to provide a nurse, on-site 7 days a week for 12hrs per day. A physician or Nurse Practitioner is on-call 24-7, and is present in the facility one day/per week to review nurse notes, referrals, and also to see patients (inmates). If necessary, Physician and Nurse Practitioner visits can now also be conducted virtually. The Wellpath medical staff plays a critical part in the Jail Division's ability to screen, identify, track and treat inmates with medical conditions.

INMATE MENTAL HEALTH

Mental Health Counseling continues to be a priority for inmates. The Shawano County Sheriff's Department – Jail Division in collaboration with the Shawano County Human Services and Wellpath continues to offer mental counseling and programming to inmates confined in the Shawano County Jail. Department of Human Services Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Program participation increased in 2024. Wellpath has been able to provide a full-time mental health counselor. The Shawano County Jail has also been in collaboration with CORE Treatment to provide Recovery staff to offer group programming to the inmates. The continuance of the mental health counseling and programming is a priority for 2025.

The Inmate Welfare Fund generates revenue from Jail commissary sales and boarding fees designated for mental health services. Expenditures are used for inmate related expenses and reduces the need for budgetary funding.

2025 Objectives:
